The Competition will:

- support the development of oracy skills.
- help students with UCAS applications and job interviews.
- promote a deeper understanding of the environment.

Shortlisted candidates will then be invited to present again in person in London, and there will be three awards (including prizes for student and the school).



- 2. The entry process is quick and easy, with entries filmed and submitted within 5 minutes. We are not judging the video quality any camera phone will do.
- 3. Finalists will meet a panel of prestigious judges including Professor Myles Allen, the physicist behind Net Zero, and climate change expert Dr Jessica Omukuti.
- 4. Winners will receive cash prizes and medals: £250 gold, £200 silver and £150 bronze.
- 5. Since 2022 is a pilot year we expect fewer entries.

Good news:



Companies said 'yes!' to a four-day week

A groundbreaking <u>four-day week</u> pilot got the thumbs up from almost nine out of every 10 firms taking part, with 86 per cent saying they plan to keep the new model.

The year-long study into the benefits of a shorter working week run by <u>4 Day Week Global</u> hit its half-way point this week.

88 per cent of companies said it was 'working well', while nearly half revealed productivity had stayed around the same level, despite the drop in hours. Over a third reported a 'slight' improvement in productivity and 15 per cent said the boost was significant.

The pilot involves more than 3,300 workers at 70 UK companies, ranging from a local chippy to large corporates. Employees get to maintain the same level of pay while enjoying a bounty of three-day weekends, but they have to promise to maintain productivity.

4 Day Week Global CEO Joe O'Connor admitted that, for some companies, the model had not been without its teething troubles, but he said that most experienced "pleasing discoveries and outcomes."
